Strategies for volatile markets

The graph below shows how a hypothetical \$100,000 investment in stocks would have been affected by missing the market's top-performing days over the 20-year period from January 1, 2005 to December 31, 2024. For example, an individual who remained invested for the entire time period would have accumulated \$717,046, while an investor who missed just five of the top-performing days during that period would have accumulated only \$452,884.


Stay invested: Missing top-performing days can hurt your return
